## **Introduction**

### **What is this compendium about?**

The compendium includes tools (e.g., red flags and indicators), guidelines, frameworks, models, protocols, measures, or assessment instruments with the purpose of recognizing victims of sexual and/or labor exploitation.

### **Who should use this compendium?**

Professionals that may come across victims of labor or sexual exploitation.

### **How was this compendium developed?**

This report was produced as the result of a literature review that followed the Preferred Reporting Items for Systematic Reviews and Meta-Analyses (PRISMA) [statement](#). We conducted searches on three scientific databases (PubMed, the Cumulative Index of Nursing and Allied Health Literature, and EMBASE) and Google Scholar and multiple sources of grey literature. In total, 101 instruments were included and categorized based on specific criteria, such as age group of victim.

### **What was our methodology?**

#### **Search Strategy**

We searched PubMed, the Cumulative Index of Nursing and Allied Health Literature (CINAHL), and EMBASE. Articles were limited to those published in English or Spanish in the past 10 years. We then used Covidence to collect and export identified studies, eliminate duplicates, and efficiently screen based on the criteria provided below. The search strategy included the following search string:

*(sex offenses (mesh term) OR human rights abuse (mesh term) OR ("forced labor" NOT obstetrics NOT cell trafficking)) AND (detect\* OR screen\* OR tool\* OR identif\* OR measur\* OR assess\* OR protocol\* OR framework\* OR model\* OR guideline\*)*

In addition to scientific articles, we searched for gray literature. To do so, we searched Google Scholar as well as consulted with experts in the field of human trafficking who shared gray literature reports. In total, we searched and compiled sources from 66 institutions/organizations as listed in the Appendix.

#### **Eligibility Criteria**

After duplicates were removed through Covidence, each article was independently reviewed by two researchers (AV and EM) based on their title and abstracts. Any discrepancies were

resolved by a third researcher (ES) when necessary. Subsequently, a full-text review was independently conducted by two researchers (AV and EM) based on predetermined criteria and a third researcher (ES) resolved any discrepancies.

Articles were included for title and abstract screening if they discussed a tool, guideline, framework, model, protocol, measure, or assessment aimed at identifying victims of sexual and/or labor exploitation or addressing survivors' service needs. The same criteria applied during the full-text review. Additionally, articles were included if they provided explicit information on how to access a tool in the public domain or details on whom to contact for access. Articles were excluded if they did not meet these criteria or if they were editorials, letters to the editor, methodological studies, webinars, educational materials or abstracts from meetings or presentations. Further exclusions were made for articles that required purchasing a tool for access and if the tool discussed did not primarily focus on human trafficking. For instance, several strengths and needs assessments yielded in our search had minimal human trafficking content. Lastly, we excluded sources if the URLs for accessing tools were nonfunctional or inactive at the time of our review.

### **Data Extraction**

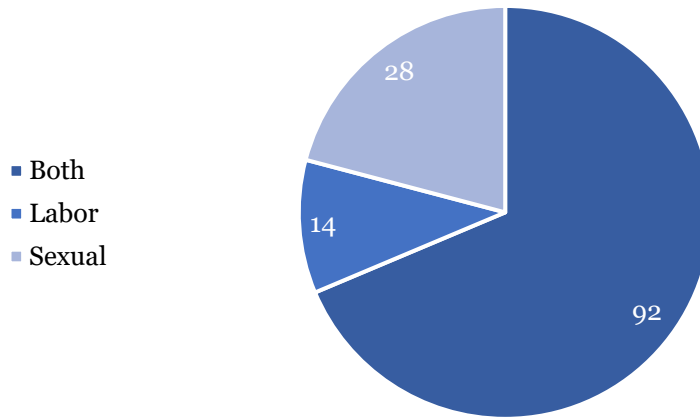
A standardized table was created for data extraction based on predetermined categories which included: a) tool name; b) target age group (e.g., adults, children, or both, or not specified); c) user of the tool (e.g., healthcare organizations, organizations working with children, judicial system, social service organizations, hospitality/ transportation/ retail industry, faith-based organizations, agency in charge of labor inspections, airline/airport industry, campus law enforcement, potential victim, students, nonspecific, or other); d) type of human trafficking (e.g., labor, sexual, or both); e) is the tool also available in Spanish (e.g., yes or no); f) did the tool undergo a validation process (e.g., yes or no); g) link to the tool; h) number of items; i) is training required for use of the tool; j) literature; and k) contact information for the tool.

### **What other formats are there of this compendium?**

There is also an online searchable [database](#) version of the compendium, the Human Trafficking Recognition Library (HTR-Lib).

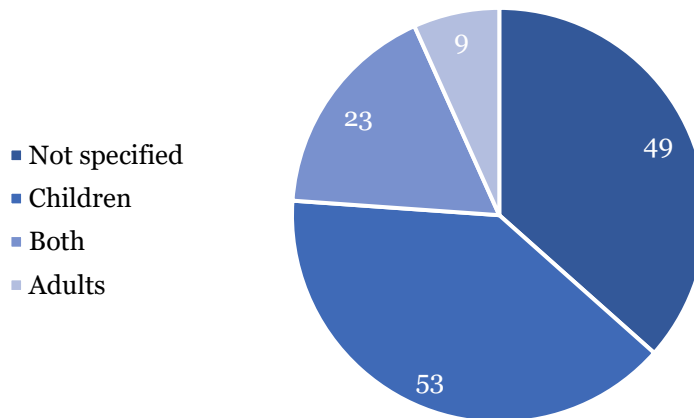
### **How many tools are included in this compendium, and what type?**

A total of 134 tools are included in the compendium. 28 focused on sex trafficking, 14 on labor trafficking, and 92 on both sex and labor trafficking (Figure 1).



**Figure 1.** Type of human trafficking.

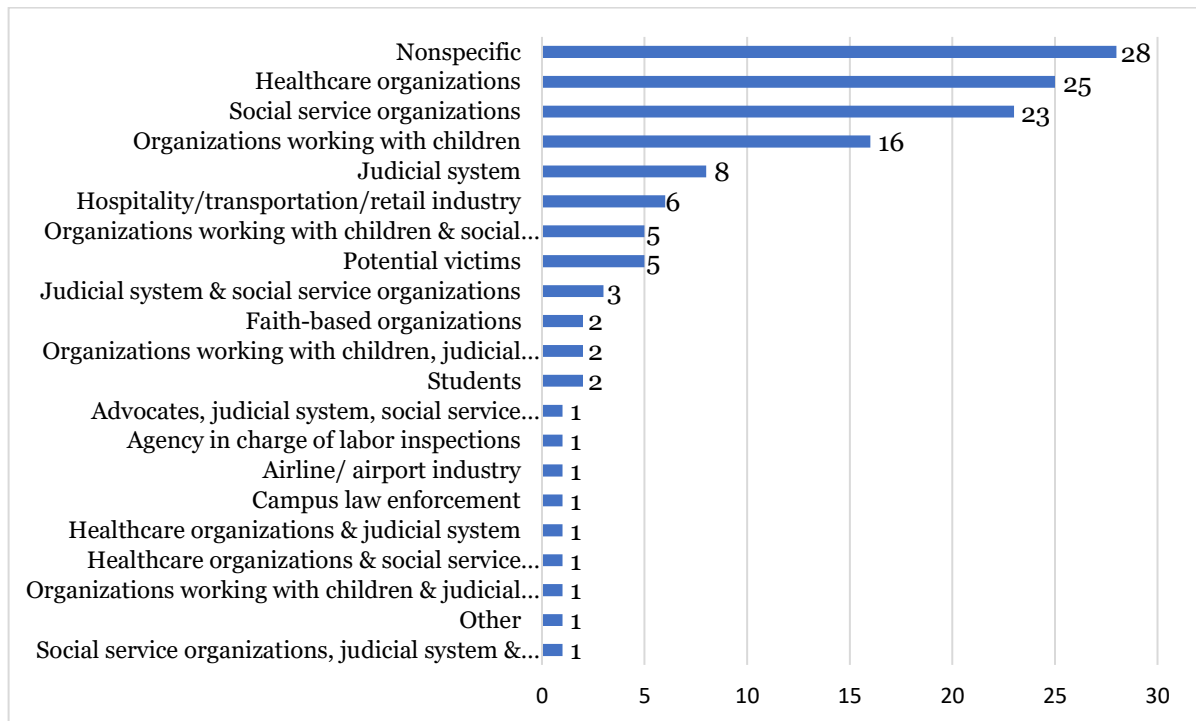
Of the 134 tools, 53 focused on child victims, 9 focused on adult victims, 23 focused on both child and adult victims, and 49 did not specify (Figure 2).

The users of the 134 tools we identified were nonspecific (28); healthcare organizations (25); social service organizations (23); organizations working with children (16); judicial system (8); hospitality/transportation/retail industry (6); organizations working with children & social service organizations (5); potential victims (5); judicial system & social service organizations (3); faith-based organizations (2); organizations working with children,

judicial system, & social service organizations (2); students (2); advocates, judicial system, social service organizations, & other (1); agency in charge of labor inspections (1); airline/airport industry (1); campus law enforcement (1); healthcare organizations & judicial system (1); healthcare organization & social service organizations (1); organizations working with children & judicial system (1); other (1); and social service organizations, judicial system, & healthcare organizations (1) (Figure 3).
